A group of illicit brewers have thrown in the towel and followed a new path of reform by enrolling for a training course for developmental skills.

Komongu Self Help Group from Chepkorio division, with the guidance of their local chief Luka Kiptoo have enrolled at Empowering Lives International to attain skills that will earn them a living as alternatives for brewing.

Propelled by the spirit of the group, exodus from the pot, more than 200 members showed willingness to register for the week long training but the capacity of the training facility could only contain 40 of them.

Samuel Teimuge, the founder and director of the training center is thrilled by the willingness and determination of the men and women who had willingly decided to stop the illicit brewing and start new lifestyles.

Gladys Kangogo, aged 29 has been in this business for the last two and half years, an activity she has shown great prowess in.

According to her, she was forced by family hardships to start brewing and to back her up; her

matrimonial family had been engaging in the activity long before her arrival.

Gladys, a mother of two was not just a usual brewer but a manager of her brewing den which she had employed a number of workers who would be paid daily wages for their job.

MARITAL HARDSHIPS

On a daily basis she would brew 100 litres of changaa, a step that elicited competition from her immediate family brewers hence betrayal to the local authorities.

The betrayal circle cost them a hype from sh 1,000 to sh 5,000 as bribe to the

Gladys wants to run a poultry business together with her husband with greater zeal and vigour than in the brewing, a new enterprise whose skills she has sharpened in the empowering lives training center.
